Child care grant application period begins Sept. 1

[Cornell's Child Care Grant Program](#) helps faculty and staff pay for child care expenses by granting awards of up to \$5,000 a year, tax free. The application period for the 2016 Child Care Grant begins Sept. 1 and ends Sept. 30.

The grant covers eligible child care, including infant and toddler day care, preschool/preK programs, school-age summer day camps/programs and school-age before/after school care.

To receive grant funds on a tax-free basis, faculty and staff must be eligible to participate in the dependent care flexible spending account. Cornell Cooperative Extension County Association employees are not eligible to apply for the grant program.


outstanding place to work.

This documentary, to be held free of charge Sept. 5 at 1, 4, and 7 p.m., in Bailey Hall, marks the 15th anniversary of the fatal dormitory fire at Seton Hall University's Boland Hall. The fire claimed the lives of three students and injured 58 others. Shawn Simons and Alvaro Llanos, two critically injured survivors, will present "After the Fire," directed by Guido Verweyen and based on Robin Gaby Fisher's bestseller of the same name, discuss their personal ordeal and answer questions.

Simons and Llanos were roommates in the dorm where the tragedy struck, were severely injured, were in recovery for a year before returning to their studies, and have dedicated their lives to preventing future tragedies by telling their story to dorm residents on college campuses around the country.

Planning for religious observances

Faculty and staff are reminded to take religious observances into account when planning events, meetings, programs, meals and travel to help fulfill the university's commitment to diversity and inclusiveness. When planning for religious holidays and observances, consider the following guidelines:

- plan meetings and events for days other than widely observed religious holidays and avoid or modify banquets and other meal events during fasting times (e.g., Ramadan, Yom Kippur, Easter)
- allow [flexible schedules](#) to accommodate religious observances
- allow staff to use available time away leave (e.g., vacation, unpaid, or [health and personal leave](#)) to accommodate religious observances
- consult the [religious accommodation process](#) to resolve conflicts between an employee's request for religious observance, e.g., head covering or facial jewelry, and the business needs of the department.

As a writer and scientist, she has delivered a TEDx Talk, has addressed the general assembly of the United Nations at the request of UN President Sam Kahamba Kutesa, of Uganda, and has won the prestigious John Burroughs Medal for Writing and the Sigurd Olson Nature Writing Award.

AARP defensive driving course
